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Becoming a Child Life Specialist

Bachelor's Degree Requirement

• A bachelor's degree (in any field of study) from an accredited academic institution by an organization.

Coursework

- Graduation from an ACLP-endorsed child life academic program or 10 college courses in the following content areas:
 - Child Life Course Taught by a CCLS
 - 2 Child Development Courses
 - Family Systems Course
 - Play Course
 - Loss/Bereavement or Death/Dying Course
 - Research Course
 - Three Additional Courses

600-Hour Child Life Clinical Internship

- Applicants must complete a minimum of 600 hours of a child life clinical internship under the direct supervision of a Certified Child Life Specialist with a minimum of 4,000 hours of paid child life clinical experience.
- the Child Life Professional Certification Exam

Becoming an *effective* Child Life Specialist

- Has domain knowledge in various subspecialties, such as surgery, radiology, oncology, palliative care..
- Has domain knowledge in the institutions she works
- Working well with children of various age groups
- Working well within the various clinical teams
- Working well with other care teams, such as radiographer, anesthesiologists...
- Continuing professional improvement
- Evidence-based practice and research
- Teaching junior colleagues, medical & nursing students, volunteers...

Becoming a Child Life Professional

- standards of education
- knowledge and skills necessary to perform their specific role
- subject to strict codes of conduct, enshrining rigorous ethical & moral obligations.
- Professional standards of practice and ethics for a particular field are typically agreed upon and maintained through widely recognized professional associations.
- serve some important aspect of public interest and the general good of society.
- enjoy considerable work autonomy
